IMPROVE PRE-CONCEPTION, PRENATAL AND POSTPARTUM HEALTH CARE SERVICES FOR WOMEN OF CHILD BEARING AGE.



### LPHA Spotlight

- McDonald County Health Department is working to increase the number of women who have an annual preventative visit and created "Self-Care Kits" to use as an incentive for women of childbearing age that complete this visit at the health department. These kits include items that promote wellness a water bottle to promote increased water intake, a pedometer to encourage walking and a cookbook to increase knowledge on preparing a healthy meal. - Atchison County Health Department hosted a "Stress Less Fest" for women of childbearing age and their children. The event included the following stations: yoga, sensory bin, coloring and stress ball making, to allow both mom and child to explore some fun and soothing ways to reduce stress and promote positive mental health. - Springfield-Greene County Health Department has required all staff to be trained in the Advancing Health Equity training series and have incorporated this training into Nurture, Empower, Support and Teach (NEST) Partnership. NEST Partnership provides nurse case management for at-risk prenatal and postpartum women or families with young children. Services are delivered in the home during scheduled visits for nurse assessment, intervention, education and collaboration with health care providers. Springfield Greene County Health Department has started a Health Equity Committee that includes a NEST member. The committee developed a Health Equity Toolkit which will be used to evaluate internal Maternal Child Health policies for equity and inclusion. - Miller County Health Center implemented two "Family Rooms", used for all WIC, breastfeeding peer counselor, and Perinatal Program appointments. These rooms use Trauma-Informed Interior Design research to create a space that both mom and children feel comfortable and safe in. The rooms also act as a centralized location for the mom to stay for the duration of her visit. Staff members are mobile and come to these rooms. - Callaway County Health Department developed a policy to screen all postpartum women that present to the health
  department for WIC services, with their consent, using the Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Screening (EPDS). The policy was
  approved by the Callaway County Commission in February 2022. As of October 2022, 85 postpartum women have been
  screened, with 22 scoring over a 10, indicating a need for referral. All postpartum women screened, regardless of score, are

PROMOTE SAFE SLEEP PRACTICES AMONG NEWBORNS TO REDUCE SLEEP-RELATED INFANT DEATHS.



### LPHA Spotlight

• Cole County Health Department created a handout to educate members of the community and breastfeeding coalition about their safe sleep program and encourage referrals. The health department and the Breastfeeding Coalition provided a portable building equipped with an air-conditioned breastfeeding area and changing table during the Cole County Fair in recognition of World Breastfeeding Week. Each night of the fair, five "swag bags" were given to the first five people who visited the booth, a total of 25 bags were given out. The bags included safe sleep information, flyers for community resources and information on the Safe Crib program. These flyers were also available at the booth for everyone.



In addition, three "Safe Sleep Survival Kits" were given as grand prizes and each kit included a pack and play, fitted crib sheet, HALO wearable sleep sack and a package of pacifiers. - Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) Office of Childhood. Find more about the program here. In addition, the health department provided Safe Sleep Kits to moms who visited their department for services such as WIC, obtaining a birth certificate or immunizations. The kits were based off of the Cribs for Kids Safe Sleep Survival Kit Model and included safe sleep education, safe sleep approved sleep sack, a pacifier and a set of fitted crib sheets. To receive feedback about the benefits of the kit, the health department asks for the participant's email address or cell phone number when the kit is provided, then provides a follow-up 4-6 weeks later. • City of Kansas City Health Department helped provide advocacy training and supportive services to 57 parents through the Parent Leadership Training Institute. While participating in the institute, Cheryl Hampton created a children's book titled "Just Like Me". In addition, the health department helped eight youth serving organizations incorporate evidence-based education and trained 14 youth serving organizations to implement the violence prevention curricula and KC Blueprint strategies. - Pulaski County Health Department has been able to increase the number of children and adolescents engaged in physical activity. The Adolescent Committed to Improvement via Exercise (A.C.T.I.V.E) program, which has been implemented by four after school programs, has collectively impacted over 100 children and adolescents who were trained to complete a 5K. In addition, the health department facilitates an AquaCize class in the summer months for women of childbearing age and children. - Randolph County Health Department utilizes a smoothie bike for several different
  health events in their county. Some events attended this year: Diaper Drive Thru
  with First Chance and WIC, Health Community Day (Health Fair), Wellness Walk
  Kick-off (3-mile route in Moberly with prompts and signs along the way), Art in the





- Park with Moberly Parks and Recreation and the Library, Sink and Snack at the Moberly Aquatic Center (coins are thrown into the pool and kids that receive a coin either get a healthy concession item or a taste test of a smoothie), and the Farmer's Market. The smoothie recipe includes frozen mixed berries, vanilla yogurt, and milk. Kara added that one thing they learned the hard way at an event was to make sure you have a bike tire pump because it will not work if the tire is flat. - Wright County Health Department has integrated oral health screenings within WIC visits. Health department
  staff obtained training and are able to provide an oral health screening, apply fluoride varnish and provide oral
  health education to child participants. The health department has created oral health kits that include a
  toothbrush, floss and toothpaste that are given to all children, ages 1-17, that visit the health department for any

- Andrew County Health Department collaborated with schools, law enforcement and first responders to implement the "Handle with Care" program. This program enables law enforcement and first responders to notify schools that a child may have been exposed to trauma and to handle them with care throughout the school day. Some examples of trauma include anytime a child is present during the arrest of a household member, a search warrant is served in the residence, a drug/alcohol overdose has occurred with a family member, death/suicide of a family member, incidents of domestic violence, physical/sexual abuse, community violence, house fires and car wrecks. - The Stone and Taney County Health Departments are using QPR (Question, Persuade, and Refer), as an evidence-based suicide prevention program, with various youth and adolescent serving community organizations, such as the Civil Air Patrol (CAP) Cadet Program and the Greater Ozarks Centers for Advanced Professional Studies (Go-CAPS). The CAP Cadet Program is a congressionally chartered, federally supported non-profit corporation that serves as the official civilian auxiliary of the United States Air Force. The program transforms youth into dynamic Americans and aerospace leaders through a curriculum that focuses on leadership, aerospace, fitness and character. As cadets participate in these four elements, they advance through a series of achievements, earning honors and increased responsibilities along the way. Many of the nation's astronauts, pilots, engineers and scientists first explored their careers through CAP. Go-CAPS participants experience real-world, project-based learning strategies through collaborations with business and community partners. These interactions enhance the learning experience by preparing students for college and career. In addition, the health departments share the work they are doing related to their Priority Health Issue as well as prepare talking points and are on the Ozarks Network Podcast System through the local radio station. - Jefferson County Health Department has created the Jefferson County Teen Coalition Group (JeffCoTeenCo). The group meets to discuss health and wellness issues they observe in their schools and develop an advocacy plan to address the issues. The health department uses various social media platforms and digital engagement to reach the community. Lastly, the health department implemented a teen wellness program titled "Healthy Choices Program", focusing on all aspects of wellness (physical, emotional and resiliency). This 5-week program includes many aspects of learning how to make healthy decisions on your own. Topics included identifying common stressors in daily life and coping skills to help deal with them, physical activity options, how to shop healthy, how to read nutrition labels and more. This was implemented in one school district in collaboration with the PE teacher and reached the entire 7th grade class. 

### LPHA Spotlight

Jackson County Health Department created a process for policy tracking, influencing and educating city/county decision-makers and community committees. The health department used the information they collected to create a policy agenda and their first quarterly newsletter for 2022. Additionally, all of their health promotion staff completed a Roots of Health Equity training, which you can find here. They have also been researching the standard of care practices in Missouri as it relates to prenatal, preconception and postpartum women. They used what they have learned from their research, as well as data they have collected specific to Eastern Jackson County and the Raytown area, to host a Community Conversation in Raytown on September 28, 2022. This Community Conversation allowed them to assess individual experiences in relation to these standards amongst prenatal, preconception and postpartum women.
